
- « Impossible de raconter la vie de **Fabio RIETI (prior to '40)** en une seule page. Fabio RIETI, ce voyageur aux trois patries l'Italie, les Etats-Unis et la France est un homme des villes. Il leur a consacré sa vie et son oeuvre. C'est aux Etats-Unis que sa carrière artistique va s'amorcer. En 1948 il migre en Italie et c'est pendant cette période qu'il va s'intéresser à la céramique qui va le conduire plus tard à l'art public. Pendant de nombreuses années il a ainsi "navigué" entre les Etats-unis et l'Italie mais c'est en 1956 qu'il décide de s'installer à Paris. Fabio RIETI a exposé ses toiles dans de nombreuses villes, à New York en 1963 et 1965, à Rome en 1969 et à Paris trois fois pendant les années 60. "je n'ai jamais fait d'expositions importantes à Paris. Il est vrai que je n'ai jamais fait une vraie carrière de peintre, je suis toujours resté quelque peu marginal. Là où je ne le suis pas resté, c'est dans l'art public, le mur peint." La carrière de muraliste de Fabio RIETI a commencé par le biais de la coloration de grands ensembles urbains comme à Bobigny. C'était le début d'une collaboration de quinze ans avec Émile Aillaud. Il a travaillé sur tous les projets ultérieurs de cet architecte comme la coloration des ensembles de Chanteloup ou de Nanterre (les tours bleues recouvertes de mosaïque sont visibles de loin). Puis il est passé maître dans l'art de réaliser de grandes mosaïques comme à Courbevoie ou à Nanterre. » (http://www.trompe-l-oeil.info/Trompeloeil/plus fabio rieti 01.htm)
- Jacques Mandelbrojt ('42 or '43): "Painter and theoretical physicist born in 1929 in Asnières, France. First oil paintings in 1943. His paintings have featured since 1954 in more than 30 one man shows and 20 international group exhibitions. Former Full Professor of physics at Université de Provence, he also created and directed from 1970 to 1973 the University Department of Visual Arts at Luminy. Member of LEONARDO editorial board since 1970. Member of MIM (Laboratoire de Musique et Informatique de Marseille), he created with the composers of MIM numerous painting-music works. His dual experience as painter and theoretical physicist led him to write since 1967, over 30 articles, published mainly in LEONARDO, on the comparison of creative processes in art and science, and two books, in particular "Les cheveux de la réalité", Editions Alliage, Nice 1991." 

Je suis restée l'amie de *Francis Seyrig* ['44] et *Delphine Seyrig* ['50] jusqu'à leur mort et je viens d'aller voir *Ludmilla Alexeieff Rockwell* ['44] lors d'un voyage à Boston que j'ai fait en Octobre. • "In the late 1940s Mario Maurin ('45) had just begun his undergraduate studies at Yale and as a French speaker didn't see much point in taking any French classes. But, based on the stellar reputation of the French scholar and professor, Henri Peyre, Maurin signed up for his class on the modern French novel and unknowingly determined his future. Under Peyre's direction Mario completed his M.A. at nineteen and his Ph.D. at twenty-two, a remarkable accomplishment; and after two years in the Marines Peyre again assisted the young Maurin by recommending him for a teaching position at Bryn Mawr College where he'd begun his American career in 1925. Mario Maurin retired from Bryn Mawr nearly fifty years later as an Emeritus Professor of French. Toward the end of his career he began to collect the prodigious correspondence of Peyre, and under the editorship of John Kneller Yale University Press published this correspondence in 2005. It would have been near the beginning of his distinguished career at Bryn Mawr that Maurin published the review of Zola's La république en marche in Les lettres nouvelles." 

• Miriam (Lipschutz) Yevick ('41) told us that she just published a book entitled "A Testament for Ariela" (available at Amazon.com). Mryriam "began writing letters to her two-month-old granddaughter, Ariela, in 1985, and continued right through to Ariela's wedding in 2006 and her motherhood in 2008. In sharing her thoughts, her values, her self-awareness, and her rapturous relationship with art and with nature, Yevick reveals the inner life of a woman of science, of passion, and of deep philosophical insight. [Her book] is a testament about the trials of being a child refugee from Nazi-occupied Holland and Belgium; about the thrill and sacrifice of becoming the fifth woman in history to earn a Ph.D. in mathematics from MIT; about the soulfulness of being a spiritually sensitive







- "If you don't know Solange (Batsell) Herter ('46), you must have ready about her. If you haven't read about her, you must have heard of her. If you've never even heard of her, are you in luck. Because you're about to meet this roman candle of a woman, in the flesh. Solange Herter was born on the same date as the Virgin Mary, and that's the last time she ever shared the spotlight. She hit the ground running, began a fabulous life, more often happening to things instead of the other way around. Hers is a tough and tender life, self-made and she's still throwing off sparks, eight decades later. If this book isn't a tell-all, we can't imagine what she left out. From her abiding friendship with Jack and Jackie Kennedy, her mother's surprising episodes with J. Edgar Hoover, becoming a seven-year-old queen Normandie on her first crossing, her boisterous run-ins with nuns in French and American schools, tangling with Barbara Walters on National TV, winning hundreds of thousands with a throw of the dice (and quitting while she was way, way ahead), opening her own art gallery in Saratoga, plunging into the wild-cat real estate of post-war Canada, singing at Carnegie Hall, playing piano at Camp David, getting into the gutter with Bobby Kennedy.....it's all her story, she takes you through triumph and trial and she's as honest about it as the day is long. Solange did it all while raising her family of children, who share her toe-to-toe approach to life. You'll also meet her 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 husbands, each unique, each different, each an unusual partner, to say the least, and each leading up to today's Number Five, Fred Herter, the New York surgeon, University President, and crooner who remains her suitor and swain to this day." 




porte volontaire pour l'Indochine, où les communistes viêt-minh viennent de déclarer l'indépendance et se battent contre la présence française. 

• Miriam (Lipschutz) Yevick ('41) wrote: "I attended the Lycée Francais de NY during the schoolyear 1940-1941, when I obtained my first bachot with mention - I forgot what. We had arrived from Europe in August 1940 after a three month flight from the Nazis' invasion of Holland and Belgium. I have written an account of our Odysee, starting from Antwerp on May 10, 1940, where we lived at the time......Most memorable from my educational point of view, was the interview I had with M. Brodin. I had first entered an American high school, where they put me back two years because I had not studied civics or American literature. I was desperate to get out of the trap and to continue my Lycée

education. My father, since we had not brought much money with us, begged the principal to give me a scholarship (tuition at that time was \$500). M. Brodin agreed and then had me tested.

There was a wonderful math teacher (I think his name was M. Klein) who asked me to write down a fifth degree polynomial with positive coefficients, which I did painlessly. He then gave me some advice which I have harkened to always follow in my mathematical carreer. "When you have a math problem, don't immediately start writing and calculating. First see it in your head, see it as a whole and only then do the detailed work."

I actually skipped one year since I had been in the troisieme in Belgium. The Lycée put me in 1ere. Then I went to NYU for college and they gave me a year of advanced standing for my Lycée studies. So I graduated in two years and went on to MIT, and ended up as the fifth woman to earn a PhD in mathematics from that Institution. Sort of a breathless career. But after the Ph.D. I was unable to find an academic job, being that I was a woman in the filed of mathematics."

• Henry-Louis de La Grange ('41 or '42) "(b.1924) studied music at Yale University, then in Paris with Yvonne Lefébure and Nadia Boulanger. Music critic for numerous French and foreign journals and periodicals, and adjunct lecturer for the Université de Tours, he is also universally recognized as the biographer of Gustav Mahler. His monumental work on the composer was published in English [and in] French and is in the process of a revised, augmented, and complete edition (four volumes) in English. Furthermore he is the author of the two-volume « Vienne. Une Histoire Musicale » . He also organized the Alziprato Festival in Corsica (1974-1979); assisted the Musée d'Art moderne de la Ville de Paris in 1985 with a large Mahler exhibition; and collaborated with the Théâtre du Châtelet with its Mahler cycle in 1989, as well as with that of Lyons in (1991-1994). He was the artistic director of the Mahler Festwoche in Toblach (Southern Tyrol) in 1986, and a co-organizer of the Mahler Festival of Amsterdam in 1995." 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



I worked with the Museum of Russian Literature and the Museum of Modern Art in Moscow this year for an exhibit which showed fifteen of his books during august and september. A magnificent catalogue is available through the publisher Vita Nova in St.Petersburg Russia.

I also helped the director of the Fondation Art ex East in Geneva to publish 115 illustrations for Cervantes's Don Quichotte's book which was printed by the Rigal printers in Fontenay aux

Roses, France. My memoirs "Snapshots" are to be published in Saint Petersburg as well. My three daughters Dominique Valery and Alexandra are very active in the Boston area and my son Alexandre is teaching film directing at NYU.



• "Claire Nicolas White ('44) is an author and translator. She has written art criticism (*Art News, Newsday*), librettos, plays, and is the author of: a family history, *The Elephant and the Rose* (The Vineyard Press, 2003); a memoir, *Fragments of Stained Glass* (Mercury House, 1989); a biography, *Joep Nicolas, His Life and Work* (Van Spijk, 1979); poetry, *Biography and Other Poems* (Doubleday, 1981), *The Bridge* (Cross Cultural Communications, 1987), *Riding at Anchor* (Waterline Books, 1994), *News From Home* (Birnham Woods Graphics, 1998); and a novel, *The Death of the Orange Trees* (Harper and Row, 1963).

Her poetry has appeared in such magazines as *The New Yorker, Partisan Review, Grand Street, Atlantic Monthly, Witness, Confrontation, The Paris Review,* and others. She is the editor of *Oberon* poetry magazine.

She translated three novels from the Dutch: *The Assault* by Harry Mulisch (Pantheon Books, 1985 Honorable mention PEN Translation prize); *The Vanishing* by Tim Krabbé (Random House, 1993); and *My Father's War* by Adraan van Dis (The New Press, 1996). "She was born in the Netherlands and came to America as a child when World War II began. In 1947 she moved to St. James, Long Island, where she has lived with her family. She was married to Robert White, the sculptor and painter, and grandson of Stanford White."

• "Claudine Herrmann ('44) became famous in France with the publication of "Les Voleuses de langue" in 1976. Her much-quoted book is now recognized as a modern classic of feminist literary criticism. Nancy Kline's welcome English translation captures the clarity and passion of observations that go beyond books to boudoirs and boardrooms. Herrmann charges that language is the fundamental means by which women are oppressed. Their education forces them to parrot masculine discourse, often gets them dismissed as chatterboxes, and silences their real lives. Women who desire to express themselves creatively are obliged to "steal" language or to invent one of their own. Based on readings of major texts in literature, philosophy, and the social sciences, "The Tongue Snatchers" illuminates how men and women differ in their experiences of words, work, space, time, love, and sexuality." - "Michel Vinaver ['44] was born in Paris in 1927. He had two novels published by Gallimard, in 1950 and 1951, on the recommendation of Albert Camus. In parallel with his business career working for the Gillette Company, he started as a playwright in 1955, never to return to the narrative form. His dramatic works include 18 plays and 7 adaptations or translations, alongside theoretical and critical essays. Upon leaving Gillette, he was appointed professor of Dramatic Studies at Université Paris III and subsequently Paris VIII. Vinaver owes to Wesleyan University, Middletown, Connecticut which awarded him a Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1947 the revelation of T. S. Eliot's The Wasteland, which he translated and which has had a never-ending impact on his dramatic writing." (From: City University of NY) His website

• Dorrit (Zucker-Hale) Cohn ('42) is the Bernbaum Professor of Literature at Harvard University. In 1999, the Modern Language Association of America awarded her its seventh annual Scaglione Prize for Comparative Literary, honoring her for her book of comparative literary theory, *The Distinction of Fiction*. Cohn said the book began as a series of essays written for various periodicals. "One was on Freud's case histories, one was on Proust, and I decided that they all fit together.
