




• **Guy Weyl** (LSY: 6eme in 1948) "was born in Strasbourg, France. He came to America with his family at the beginning of World War II and they became American citizens. Homesick for France, Guy returned to attend the prestigious Physics and Chemistry School of Paris in 1960. After his graduation, he returned to the U.S. to begin his career in infrared physics, and then pursued a PhD in theoretical plasma physics at UCLA as a Hertz Fellow (1967). Guy worked for several decades as a physicist in

companies doing government funded research, where he specialized in the interaction of high intensity laser beams with materials. In addition to his passion for math and science, Guy always has been (and still is) an avid skier. Weyl's skiing claim to fame is to have beaten the future world ski champion, Jean Claude Killy, in a slalom race in Val d'Isere, 'I was 22 and placed 3rd; he was 15 and fell.' "







University. Taught at MSU (1963-1974) as assistant and then associate professor of the Topology Chair..... He was forced to leave MSU for political reasons in 1974, worked as the math editor of Kvant magazine (1975-1989), wrote several articles and did a lot of creative rewriting of popular science materials for Kvant. He was (and still is) active in the International Mathematics Tournament of Towns (in particular in its Summer Schools). He resumed teaching at the university level after perestroika (1989), first at the Moscow Institute of Electronics and Mathematics, and then at the Independent University of Moscow. Was the Moderator of the Panel Mathematiques et Grand Public at the First Congress of the European Mathematical Union (Paris 1992).....He has written several popular science booklets in mathematics..... Alexei is basically a research mathematician (algebraic and geometric topology) and university teacher, without any published research work in mathematical education, but has always had a strong interest in mathematical education, mathematics competitions, and the popularization of mathematics." - Elizabeth (Reiss) Baecher shared this with us: "Not all that much to report from here. I am involved in the congressional and state senate campaign, play as much on line bridge as I can find time for, and for exercise, hike and go on coin and bottle digs. I don't expect to find anything of great value, but it's great fun."
- "Michel Strauss brings to Fine Art Wealth Management over 43 years of experience advising many great collectors and has been responsible for the sale of numerous important paintings and collections. An Art Historian and renowned expert in the field of Impressionism and 20th Century art, his expertise covers the period from 1865 to 1973, from the birth of Impressionism to the death of Picasso. Michel Strauss was Head of Sotheby's Impressionist and Modern Art Department and Board member from 1965 to 2000. During this time he assisted the British Rail Pension Fund in building their collection from Impressionist paintings from 1974 to 1979. Following his successful career at Sotheby's, he went to work for Bernard Arnault of LVMH to build their corporate collection in Paris followed by a brief period at Phililips de Pury & Luxembourg before becoming an independent consultant."




"Ending months of fervid speculation, the Metropolitan Museum of Art reached into its own ranks on Tuesday and chose Thomas P. Campbell, a 46-year-old English-born tapestries curator, to succeed Philippe de Montebello as director and chief executive. The appointment, effective Jan. 1, was approved in a late-afternoon vote by the museum's board of trustees after a suspenseful eight-month search that began when Mr. Montebello, 72, announced plans to retire after 31 years in the post...."


