- **Daniele (Ryvlin) Spellman** : "[....] I immigrated with my family to the United States in 1952 and spent the next twenty years in New York City [....] where I first learned about America, its language and its people, and where I began to develop my own imagery. I attended Parson's School of Design where I studied graphics and in 1960 returned to Paris to spend a year at the Ecole Nationale Supérieure des Arts Décoratifs. I came back to New York, ended my studies to further explore image making. I left New York in the '70s to move to San Francisco, where I turned to printmaking first trying out a number of techniques but quickly settling on monotyping. I now also work with photo transfers adding another graphic element to the composition and design.

Making what I call "art inside the cracks," looks to translate life's unseen and often critical moments into images that go beyond the personal. Titles and themes are often identified through key words and bits of phrases incorporated in each print. The use of language, French and English, serves as a graphic element and helps me label and group prints thematically. The prints included in the gallery pages are samples from series and commissions I have worked on." (<http://www.artselves.com/artist.html>)


● **"Carey Harrison** was born in London to actors Rex Harrison and Lilli Palmer, and raised in Los Angeles and New York, where he attended the Lycée Français. Subsequently, in Britain, he attended Sunningdale Preparatory School, Harrow School, and Jesus College, Cambridge.....He is the author of 35 stage plays and 16 novels, most notably Richard's Feet..... Harrison has received numerous grants from the UK Arts Council, and his prizes include Sony Radio Academy Awards, the Giles Cooper Award, the Prix Marulic, the UK Writers' Guild Award for Best Play, the Prix Italia Silver Award and the Best Play award from the Berlin Akademie der Kuenste, as well as two nominations (2005 and 2007) for the Pushcart Prize for Journalism. His work has been translated into thirteen languages. His output includes published translations from French, Italian, German and Spanish authors, and performed translations from the works of Pirandello, Goldoni, Feydeau and the late Gert Hofmann; most recently he published 20 Poems from the Arabic of Firas Sulaiman, in Banipal, the UK magazine of contemporary Arabic writing. Since 2005 he has contributed a monthly essay on linguistic trends in The Vocabula Review. Harrison's essays have appeared in magazines as diverse as New Politics: a journal of socialist thought, and Chronicles: a paleoconservative magazine of American culture. He has also been a book reviewer for numerous newspapers and journals including the San Francisco Chronicle[6], the



● **François Pettit** nous a envoyé ce message pour ses *classmates*:




Bien qu'à peine un demi-siècle se soit écoulé depuis qu'on était en classe ensemble, j'ai eu envie de vous donner quelques (brèves) informations sur mon parcours depuis, pour ne pas qu'un nouveau demi-siècle passe et que certains d'entre vous ne soient plus là pour me lire et peut-être me répondre.....

J'étais l'ainé des 4 frères Pettit qui ont débarqué au LFNY en 1957...et j'entends encore notre père se plaignant amèrement (malgré sa situation de diplomate) du budget que celà représentait.

J'ai passé 3 années au lycée, au terme desquelles j'ai largement raté mon bac...que je suis parti repasser en France, en pension au lycée de Fontainebleau. Après des études plutôt modestes en raison d'un dilettantisme persistant dont on m'a toujours accusé (à juste titre!), j'ai débarqué un jour chez

Publicis, puis 2 ans plus tard chez Bates et enfin chez Lintas.

Ces quelques années dans la pub m'ont enfin donné l'envie et le goût de travailler, et je suis entré en 1971 chez Nestlé, où j'ai sévi...pendant les 33 années suivantes, jusqu'à ma retraite! 
