- **Virginia (Utermohlen) Lovelace MD** (*LSY: Terminale in 1961*) shared this with us: "A revelatory experience at classmate (and fellow physician) **André Vasu's** birthday party one year, coupled with a background in biology and chemistry, led me to my post-retirement work: writing about the experience of flavor, with (currently) an emphasis on tea.

André's mother presented a game: to identify herbs and spices that she presented in little bowls. It turned out that I was able to identify quite a few, which in turn led me to ponder (for years) the nature of taste and flavor.

My work, first as a physician and then for 40+ years as a faculty member in the Division of Nutritional Sciences at Cornell University in Ithaca NY, led me in other directions, but now that I am retired I have time to experiment and understand and write about flavor.

This year I self-published a book *Three Basic Teas & How to Enjoy Them* where you can find out about the chemistry of tea, the biology of our flavor systems, and about how they interact, plus suggestions for foods (including herbs and spices!) to pair with teas that maximize your enjoyment of both tea and food, and don't make the tea taste like so much hot water.



Réalisatrice, elle est à l'origine de nombreuses productions cinématographiques, de la création des éditions des Femmes et du journal *L'Idiot international*. Descendante de la famille Schlumberger, [elle] touche, à l'âge de 21 ans, un héritage important. Engagée dans le militantisme



En mars 1979, à Téhéran, elle coréalise un documentaire intitulé *Mouvement de libération des femmes iraniennes, Année Zéro*, sur les manifestations des femmes iraniennes contre le port obligatoire du voile imposé en Iran. En octobre 1979, [elle dépose] à la préfecture de police une association du nom de « Mouvement de libération des femmes - MLF », et [enregistre] le MLF et son logo comme marque commerciale Ce qui fait polémique.

Au printemps 1999, elle est en mission pour l'AFD (Alliance des femmes pour la démocratie) à Tirana pour [porter] secours aux femmes kosovares réfugiées en Albanie.

En 2004, elle dirige *Depuis 30 ans des femmes éditent...Histoire de femmes 1974-2004*, une anthologie historique consacrée aux éditions des femmes. »

● **Michel Ray de Carvalho** (LSY : 9eme in 1952: "Well before he arrived at Harvard Business School (MBA 1970) [he] had led a charmed life. But it was only destined to get better. Already a veteran child actor at 17, he was tapped to play one of Peter O'Toole's young Arab sidekicks in the film *Lawrence of Arabia*.....In addition to having to learn how to ride a camel, his experience included tagging along for rest and recuperation in Beirut with O'Toole and Omar Sharif as—with the help of countless female admirers—they relaxed from the rigors of location shoots in the desert. Memorable partying ensued, but as de Carvalho commented to the Irish Daily Mail (November 12, 2012), "We couldn't possibly discuss the fun in an elegant family newspaper...they were the superstars and I was the bag carrier. But even superstars can only handle so much. And then the bag carrier." The son of a Brazilian-diplomat father and English mother, de Carvalho attended school in Switzerland and became such an accomplished skier that he represented Great Britain in the 1968 Winter Olympics, and again in 1972 and 1976, both" times in the luge. By then, he had decided to give up moviemaking to attend Harvard College and HBS. He later embarked on a career in banking, married into the Heineken brewery empire, settled in London, raised a family, and rose to become vice-chairman of Citigroup. Perhaps his only regret: 'Looking back, it was probably a mistake quitting acting.' "



I took early retirement from Reuters news agency in 2001 after 32 years as a journalist based on four continents and reporting from more than 50 countries. I've done journalistic freelance work since then and my favorite "string" is writing the monthly history pages of Terre Information Magazine, the main French Army monthly. I'm also a member of the board of the "Association des journalistes de defense" where I'm in charge of organizing at least one annual visit to foreign military establishments. The trips usually last a week and about a dozen French journalists specialized in defense affairs participate, representing the general press (Le Monde, Le Figaro etc) or specialized publications (Air et Cosmos, Aviation Week, etc). I'm the tour leader and have had the privilege of taking groups to see foreign armies, bases, vessels etc and meet defense ministers and other top officials in: the U.S. (three trips), China, Britain, Israel, Germany (two trips each), Japan, South Korea and Mongolia. It's very interesting.... and great fun!"

As an Acting Justice, she presided over a General Trial and then a Matrimonial Part.....Throughout her legal career, Justice Bransten has been active in numerous bar associations and organizations.....Justice Bransten served as the Presiding Member of the New York State Bar Association's Judicial Section in 2008. Justice Bransten is currently a member of the City Bar Association's Council on Judicial Administration. She also previously served on the City Bar Association's Committee on State Courts Of Superior Jurisdiction and on the City Bar Association's Medical Malpractice Committee.....Justice Bransten is a graduate of Hunter College (summa cum laude, 1975) and Fordham University School of Law (class of 1979). After law school, from 1979 to 1984, she served in the Queens County District Attorney's Office and then worked as a solo practitioner for seven years. In 1992, she became the Principal Court Attorney and Law Secretary to Supreme Court Justice Jacqueline W. Silbermann.....In 2000, Justice Bransten was inducted into the Hunter College Alumni Hall of Fame and presently serves on the Board of Directors of Fordham University Law School.....Justice Bransten and her husband, John Simpson--former Director of Constituent Services and Senior Affairs to Manhattan Borough President Scott Stringer--are long-time residents of Manhattan. They thoroughly enjoy traveling, reading books, going to the theater and



Son père, Philippe Wiener de Croisset (1911-1965), dirigea le magazine Marie-Claire ; ce dernier était lui-même le fils de Franz Wiener, homme de lettres, dit Francis de Croisset. **Carrière** : Il est membre de l'Inspection générale des finances (IGF). Il est président directeur général du Crédit commercial de France (CCF) de 1993 à 2004. Depuis mars 2004, il est conseiller international chez Goldman Sachs et vice-président de Goldman Sachs Europe. Il préside le conseil d'administration de la Fondation du Patrimoine depuis 2005. Il est membre d'honneur de l'Observatoire du patrimoine religieux (OPR), une association multiconfessionnelle qui œuvre à la préservation et au rayonnement du patrimoine culturel français. »

● **Catherine Temerson** "was brought up bilingually in French and English and has advanced degrees from Harvard and New York University. She has worked in film and theater, taught language and literature, authored books in French, and translated fiction and non-fiction books, plays, interviews, essays, and screenplays. Her most recent translations include Elie Wiesel's "The Sonderberg Case" (Knopf), "Rashi" (Nextbook) and "A Mad Desire to Dance" (Knopf), Amin Maalouf's "Origins" (FSG, awarded a grant by the Cultural Services of the French Embassy), Florence Noiville's "Isaac B. Singer, A Life" (FSG) and Hiner Saleem's "My Father's Rifle: A Childhood in Kurdistan" (FSG). Her translation of "The Shadows of Ghadames" by Joëlle Stolz received a Batchelder Award and was on the IBBY Honor List 2006 for the quality of the translation."

They spent ten days in Mongolia and South

Korea. 'On this visit, the Mongolian army took us round the base where they train their troops for international peacekeeping missions in countries with climates as different as Sudan and Afghanistan,' Edinger says. 'Average winter temperatures in Mongolia itself hover between minus 20 and minus 30 centigrade while summer temperatures can reach plus 40 centigrade.' They also visited South Korea including two days inside and close to the Demilitarised Zone (DMZ) between the two Koreas. 'Incidents are relatively rare but a North Korean soldier killed two of his superiors and defected to the South the day after our visit.' "



- **Barbara (Bailer) Smiley** told us that she "is retired from teaching and is living in Columbia, SC."


● **Benedetta Barzini** "(born September 22, 1943, in Porto Santo Stefano) is an Italian actress and model, daughter of Italian journalist and author Luigi Barzini, Jr. and his second wife, heiress Paola Gadola Feltrinelli....She was a model from 1963-1969 and established a successful fashion career in New York City. In December 1966, she was named one of the "100 Great Beauties of the World" by the American fashion magazine Harper's Bazaar. That same year, Barzini became involved with, and later engaged to, New York poet and media artist Gerard Malanga, an early collaborator of Andy Warhol. Malanga's black-and-white film *In Search of the Miraculous* (1967) is an emotional, vivid poem of adoration for Barzini.

She was clearly headed for the top rank of New York models, but decided to return to Italy to act. She met Italian film director Roberto Faenza, and they married in 1969....In 1973 she left the modeling business to become a Marxist and radical feminist organizer in her hometown of Milan. She joined the Italian Communist Party. As of 2008, she is teaching in Milan."

We followed nine evenings of training, including First Aid, CPR, Search and Rescue, Triage, Fire suppression... We've also gone back to the Fire Department for recertification and refresher sessions.

As you probably know, this was Florida's year of the multiple hurricanes. So we got to put our training to good use, though not the kind of activities we expected...actually much less traumatic than we were prepared for. Mostly we waited out the storm, and then donned out hard hats and brightly colored vests, grabbed saws, and went around cutting branches around neighbors' homes, that were preventing them from getting out of their homes. I think the most important service we rendered was looking "official", giving people a sense of security.

All in all, out of 901 homes in our association, we lost 150 trees, some roof tiles, a few windows, quite a lot of our sprinkler system. But no one was injured, except in the pocketbook. If anyone is curious, you might look up CERT on the internet."

Mon premier mari, qui du reste fut la principale raison de ma venue en Afrique, était Ingénieur et Député à l'Assemblée Nationale de ce pays. Côté travail, j'ai eu plusieurs postes intéressants au cours de ma carrière (entre autres 10 ans avec l'OMS (in English WHO)) et le dernier poste chez Apache Int'l, exploration et exploitation pétrolière, en tant que DAF, d'où j'ai fait valoir mes droits à la retraite pour aussitôt installer une cellule de traduction (home-based). J'ai un tantinet élargi la gamme de prestations et offre maintenant des "Services de la Paie" (payroll) et l' "Archivage électronique".

A côté de cela, j'aide autant que possible ma fille (la plus jeune parmi mes enfants et la seule fille) qui a étudié la gestion hôtelière en France et s'est lancée depuis le début de l'année dans un "Service Traiteur" à Abidjan. Les autres enfants, 3 garçons, (un Informaticien, à Paris ; un Banquier -MBA en Californie, résidant à Abidjan, à la Standard Chartered Bank ; et un Chirurgien-Urologue, pratiquant à Paris) tous mariés. ● « **Naomi Schor**, ancienne élève du Lycée, occupait la chaire de français "Benjamin F. Barge" à l'université de Yale. En tant qu'enseignante et écrivain, elle a défié les conventions de façon implacable, ainsi que dans un journal féministe qu'elle avait cofondé en 1989 au Centre Pembroke, pour l'enseignement et la recherche sur la femme à Brown University. Née le 10 octobre 1943 à Manhattan, de parents artistes—son père, Ilya, était peintre, joaillier et spécialisé dans l'art judaïque, et sa mère Resia, également artiste. Ils furent contraints de quitter leur Pologne natale, sous l'occupation nazie, pour gagner Paris, puis finalement s'installer à New York le 3 décembre 1941, en passant par Lisbonne.

Titulaire du baccalauréat du Lycée Français de New York en 1961, elle suivit des études d'anglais et fut diplômée de Barnard College. Par la suite, elle reçut son doctorat de français de l'université de Yale. Elle est l'auteur de cinq livres publiés et plus de cinquante articles universitaires. Dr. Schor a enseigné à l'université de Brown, Duke, et Harvard avant d'intégrer Yale en 1999, où son époux, Howard Bloch,

enseigne au département de français. Naomi Schor a succombé d'une hémorragie cérébrale le 2 décembre 2001, alors qu'elle était hospitalisée à New Haven .Elle était âgée de 58 ans et résidait à Hamden (état du Connecticut). Son époux, sa mère et sa soeur (Mira Schor '67) lui survivent. »

● **DÉCÈS:** Une triste nouvelle nous est parvenue pendant la rédaction de cette Newsletter, nous annonçant le décès début décembre de **Naomi Schor**. Ceci nous a été communiqué par Michel-André Bossy: "Une nouvelle extrêmement triste m'a été communiquée hier: notre camarade de lycée Naomi Schor '61 est décédée dimanche d'une hémorragie cérébrale. Naomi Schor a fait toutes ses études scolaires au LFNY, depuis ce qui s'appelait à l'époque la onzième jusqu'au bac de philo en 1961. C'était une élève brillante et une camarade de classe inoubliable. Ensuite, elle a suivi une carrière universitaire tout à fait remarquable. Elle occupait en effet une chaire de lettres à Yale University, étant finalement revenue dans le même département de français où elle avait jadis obtenu son doctorat. Entre temps, sa carrière a été jalonnée de postes dans des facultés de haute volée: Columbia, Brown, Duke et Harvard. Etant encore sous le coup de cette nouvelle bouleversante, je ne suis pas en mesure de détailler ici, comme il le faudrait, les grands mérites personnels, l'immense talent intellectuel et les excellents ouvrages critiques de Naomi Schor. Néanmoins, je n'ai pas voulu tarder à vous transmettre cette nouvelle, qui va beaucoup attrister les anciens de la promotion de 1961 et bien d'autres amis."

● **Pierre Perolle** nous a écrit, peu de temps après: «Quite coincidentally this morning I learned of the untimely death of my classmate, Naomi Schor, through a very random set of connections. We were good school chums from the ages of 6 to 17 then, sadly in retrospect, lost direct contact because of different pathways in life. This would probably not have been the case had the Internet been around sooner. I am grateful, though, that thanks to your efforts, our classmates are able to pick up the threads now, even many decades after our precious years together at 3 E 95th St.».
