


Winter Hill is a new play from internationally acclaimed playwright Timberlake Wertenbaker, author of the Olivier award winning Our Country's Good......The theatre has revealed a cast line-up for the show which includes some well-known female faces from the stage, and big and small screens.....Timberlake's new play explores how a group of seemingly ordinary women endeavor to protect their local community, no matter the cost and questioning the lengths people go to for a cause they believe in, and at what point does the fight for freedom become terrorism?

Timberlake said: 'I wanted to look at what it means for women to resist, how far they'll go and what the consequences might be. And then one day, I took a walk-up Winter Hill and found the broad lines











- Dana (Dauterman) Ricciardi (LSY: 9eme in 1954) is the Curator of the Framingham Historical Society.
- Lorca Massine (LSY: 7eme in 1956): "Born in New York, son of Leonide Massine, he has studied and collaborated with the greatest choreographers of our time: Balanchine, Bejart, and Leonide Massine. He has inherited his father's penchant for story ballets and combined this with his unusual ability of illustrating contemporary themes in dance using the classical idiom. He has choreographed more than fifty ballets and musical productions. The original version of Zorba, which premiered at the Arena of Verona, has been seen in more than thirty countries by over three million enthusiastic spectators. Massine's undertaking of the APASSIONATA-Ovations Tour, an equine choreographic extravaganza, set new standards!

His works have been in the repertoires of internationally acclaimed companies such as New York City Ballet, American Ballet Theater, the Birmingham Royal Ballet, Bejart's Ballet of the Twentieth Century, and the Paris Opera Ballet, and have been performed on the stages of international opera houses from the Metropolitan Opera House in New York to Teatro alla Scala i(Milan), Teatro la Fenice (Venice), Teatro San Carlo(Naples), Teatro dell'Opera (Rome), Teatro Carlo San Felice (Genoa), Teatro Massimo (Palermo), the Royal Opera House at Covent Garden (London), and the Arena di Verona. Lorca Massine is also the heir to Leonide Massine's vast heritage. - Liselotte Waldheim-Natural wrote: "I was a student at the French Lycée in New York, but only for a very short time, I believe from memory and without checking in old files, that it was in 1955-56. My father was a diplomat and I continued my education in other French schools and finally graduated in 1963 in the French Lycée in Vienna. As an Austrian citizen, my French Baccalaureate was not recognized at the Vienna University and I had to sit for the equivalent Austrian Matura a few months later to enroll at the faculty of Law. After passing my first State Examination in Law, I moved to New York to enroll at Columbia University in the then School of International Affairs from which I graduated in spring of 1967. In August 1967 I joined the United Nations Secretariat and lived in New York until August 1970. During all this time I did not renew contact with the Lycée in New York and do not remember staff or other students. After 38 Years of continuous service in the UN Secretariat in various countries, I retired in June 2005 from active duty. I am a member of the Association des Anciens Elèves du Lycée Français de Vienne, from which I had graduated after the last three years in school."
- Daniel Bollinger wrote: « J'ai 4 enfants et 4 petits enfants. J'ai depuis l'année 1970 travaillé exclusivement comme consultant international en gestion du changement. playwrights in the late 1980s, after various of her award-winning plays including 'Our Country's Good' and 'Three Birds Alighting on a Field' were premiered at the Royal Court. Born Lael Louisiana Timberlake Wertenbaker in New York and raised in Northern Basque Country, France, she was the daughter of Charles Wertenbaker - a foreign correspondent for Time Magazine and Lael Tucker Wertenbaker - author of various novels.........[She] graduated from St. John's College 1966 and began her career writing for Time-Life books. She then went on to professional teaching, lecturing in both Greek and French, before moving to London in the early '80s, where she first developed an interest in writing for the theater, and became a resident-writer for the small theater companies Shared Experience in 1983 and the Royal Court Theatre from 1984-85......She is better known for her later play 'Our Country's Good' - adapted from Thomas Keneally's novel 'The Playmaker'. It chronicled the English arriving in Australia in the late 18th century and was premiered at the Royal Court Theatre on the 10th of September, 1988......


Since then she has continued adapting (and sometimes translating) various novels to the stage. These works include pieces by Marivaux, Anouilh, Maeterlinck, Pirandello, Sophocles and Euripides. She has also written several screenplays including the film adaptations of Edith Wharton's The Children and Henry James's The Wings of the Dove. She also wrote the television play, Do Not Disturb......Her most recent play - 'Galileo's Daughter' adapted from the Dava Sobell novel was premiered by the Peter Hall Company in Bath, July, 2004. She currently resides in England."


