




Jean Francois Lloan Reyssi, a.k.a. "Juan Francisco" in Venezuela where I live since I was 5 years old, (born in Paris; 95 Av. Victor Hugo). We moved to NYC in February 1957 for 3 years. I attended 1957-1958 the Lycée. Of that time the fondest memories. That year I used to ride my bicycle to the Lycée from home at 400 East 55th St. guite early to be able to ride a horse 3 times a week (rented from one of the stables, now gone, on the West side of the Park); I remember a secret crush for Violaine Coulondre ('62), beautiful, the best student, and unattainable; the fist fight, horresco refferens, with *Edouard van Rijckevorsel ('62)*, the brilliant drawing talent of Jean-Michel Giraud ('62) (witness that year's yearbook), the benevolence of Mr.J.C. Sasportas, our Spanish teacher, the redoubtable but just severity of **Prof. Martin Kieffer**, our Prefect, the momentous fact that the French teacher, and all the others taught me to think imaginatively. Mother had her offices at 720 Fifth Av. where she took charge of Lancôme for the whole US, until the end of 1959. Went back to Caracas where I finished High School and went on to study law at Venezuela's Central U.(UCV). Graduated in 1966, went 2 more years for doctorate studies. Practicing law since 1968, in the Escritorio Tinoco Firm (full partner since 1973) until 1982 when I opened my own firm, Escritorio LLoan & Asociados. Constitutional Law teacher at the Andrés Bello, Catholic U. (UCAB) from 1972 until 2000, thus for 28 years, until I resigned upon the establishment of the 1999 Constitution which I considered to be a blueprint for autocracy. Sadly, time has confirmed that judgment. The pressure of legal practice and a somewhat lazy nature had it so that I only managed to present my PhD thesis in constitutional law last year (SJD); it was approved in November. That joy was added to a previous one when my first grandson was born in London inlast September."

My dad Pierre Chevalier died in 1972. My mom, 92, is in a nursing home. I have 2 grandkids : Victor 13, Elena 11 who live in Geneva. Fabienne has an executive position with World Intellectual Property Organization. I enjoy a happy retirement, still cooking for a few privileged clients and family. I feel really blessed to have attended the Lycée for 7 years and to have had the opportunity of receiving the best education dispensed by wonderful teachers such as Mr. Brodin and Mr.Kieffer. 



Returning to UW-Madison, she became director of communications in the Division of International Studies. During a sabbatical year, from 2004 to 2005, she taught middle school English in France. She has contributed to many publications – national, regional and local – including *Saveur, The Christian Science Monitor*, and The *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel*. 

Polgar was the protégé and piano student of the Pa/Pa's Chairman, Dr. Robert Starling Pritchard and in 1972, accompanied Dr. Pritchard as a member of the Pritchard Concert Ensemble (PCE) during his concert tour of Africa. The Pritchard Concert Ensemble gave a Command Performance before Zambian President Kenneth Kaunda and toured major towns and cities in Zambia. One of the focal points of the PCE tour was the momentous meeting between Dr. Pritchard and African liberation leaders during their countries` fight for independence. In 1987, M. Polgar also accompanied Dr. Pritchard during his tour of China and the Pacific Rim countries The tour of China culminated in a Sino-US Sports and Cultural Exchange Agreement with the Shanghai, China Culture and Sports Commission and with All-China Sports Federation in Xinjiang Province [.....] In 1988, M. Polgar appeared in the Black History Month Founder's Concert at "Applecrest" [.....] M. Polgar was a recipient of Lincoln University President's Award during the 1988 Homecoming and Rededication Day Concert at Lincoln University, Pennsylvania (the nation's oldest institution of higher education for African and African-American students) [.....] As Pa/Pa NGO Representatives to the United Nations ECOSOC, M. and Mme. Polgar collaborated with members of the Onondaga Indian Nation in Central New York to bring to public attention the dire circumstances of life on the Nation and the murder of a prominent and outspoken critic of the Nation leadership (Mr. Ronald Jones). They attended the UN Indigenous People's Day; gave their support to a complaint presented to the UN Commission on Human Rights, and assisted in publishing a newspaper, "The Onondaga Progressive," as a voice for those on the Nation whose human rights have been violated [.....]" (http://site1.pacinternational.org/advisors2.html)









Inspecteur Général de l'Equipement depuis 1995 et membre du Conseil Général des Ponts et Chaussées, elle est la première femme issue de l'ENA à y occuper les fonctions de Président de section......Elle a préalablement à sa nomination à l'Inspection Générale de l'Equipement en 1995, occupé des fonctions de

responsabilité croissante comme chargée de mission à la Direction des Affaires Economiques du Ministère de la Coopération (1966-1968), chargée de mission à la direction des Industries Agricoles et alimentaires; Assistant au Fonds d'Orientation et de Régularisation des Marchés Agricoles ;et chargée de mission au cabinet de Michel Cointat, ministre de l'Agriculture (questions budgétaires et internationales) (1970-1972). A la sortie de l'ENA, elle a, de 1976 à 1980 comme jeune Administrateur Civil au Ministère des Transports (Mer), été en charge des négociations internationales maritimes bilatérales. De 1980 à 1987 elle a été successivement été Attaché Financier près la Représentation Permanente de la France auprès des Communautés Economiques, Conseiller des Affaires Etrangères à la Direction d'Europe Etrangères et au Service des Questions Atomiques du Ministère des Affaires et Premier Conseiller à l'Ambassade de France à Yaoundé. Elle rejoint en février de la même année, le Cabinet de Madame Simone VEIL et est nommée, en avril 1995, conseiller auprès du Ministre d'Etat, Ministre des Affaires Sociales de la Santé et de la Ville. De novembre 1996 à janvier 1998, elle est Secrétaire Général du Haut Comité pour le Logement des Personnes Défavorisées et, de janvier 1998 à janvier 1999, Secrétaire Général du Haut Conseil à l'Intégration." 

William Rodarmor ('60) was kind enough to send us these updates on two of his classmates:

• Andre Vasu ('62), who practices thoracic surgery in Punta Gorda, Florida, avoided a close encounter of the blast kind with Hurricane Charley, whose 150-mph winds tore his roof and demolished his medical practice building. In his very grim photos, his office looks like a Baghdad bombing. Good thing André himself had the good sense to be 1,400 miles away in Rhode Island. He writes: "We watched on the radar screen as Charley went directly over our house. My wife Peg said, 'Good thing we weren't home. I would have been out of there at the last minute and would have been hit in the head with a flying 2 x 4.' My F-27 sailboat went airborne, flipped 180 degrees, and smashed on the dock, amputating three ten-inch-thick pilings. Need new roof coverings but contents of home OK. Medical office destroyed. But all is well and we will come back to fight another day."

• William continues: "**Geoffrey Morson** ('62) has made a splash of another kind, by contributing half a dozen biographies to the massive new Oxford Dictionary of National Biography. "All my articles are on fairly specialized subjects," Geoffrey writes from Cambridge, "but Hamilton will have a quite wide appeal." That's putting it mildly. An 18th century diplomat, Sir William Hamilton was famous both as an art collector and a jilted husband. His lovely young wife Emma took up with Lord Nelson, the already-married hero of the Nile, and they all then lived together openly in London. "That would create a stir even today," writes Geoff. "In 1800, it was an outrage, but people had to swallow it. Nelson was the military hero of his era and was needed to defeat Napoleon at sea (which he did).
